After Pelican River, Oneida County Officials Make Land Use Policies Less Conservation Friendly

County board members in Oneida County who opposed the conservation of the Pelican River Forest are now working to make the county's land use policies less conservation friendly. The Pelican River Forest is the largest conservation project in state history, setting aside 70,000 acres of forest land across Langlade, Forest and Oneida counties. Eleven months later the two agencies issued their report – a data rich 77-page report filled with tables and charts.
