# Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources Reports New Invasive Insect

Officials with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) are reporting a new invasive species that is taking aim at trees across the state. According to a release from the DNR, the elm zigzag sawfly, named for the distinctive zigzag pattern its caterpillars chew in elm leaves, originated in eastern Asia and was first detected in the United States in 2021 in Virginia. *Read More* 

# **Elm Zigzag Sawfly**

The elm zigzag sawfly (EZS), Aproceros leucopoda (Hymenoptera: Argidae) is an invasive sawfly that attacks elm trees (Ulmus spp.). This insect gets its name from the distinctive "zigzag" feeding pattern of young larvae. EZS is native to parts of East Asia. In its native range it is considered a minor pest and is kept in check by natural enemies. <u>Read More</u>

# Not Just Another Piece of Wood: 50,000th wood specimen catalogued at Forest Products Laboratory

The Forest Products Laboratory has cataloged the 50,000th specimen into its Center for Wood Anatomy Research Wood Collection. Collected by Dr. Michael Nee in the Andean mountains of Bolivia from a small tree in the Verbenaceae family called Recordia boliviana Moldenke, the addition of this 50,000th specimen is in his honor. Dr. Nee started collecting wood specimens in Wisconsin in 1969. His collections, now at 3,200 with 1,100 specimens from Bolivia, have all been donated into the Center for Wood Anatomy Madison Wood Collection at the Forest Products Laboratory. *Read More*
