The story of the first ever national inventory of mature and old growth forests. The White House recently challenged the stewards of the public lands of the United States, including the Forest Service and the Bureau of Land Management, to produce the first ever national inventory of mature and old growth forests. The next phase of the project will be augmented by NASA laser altimetry data from an instrument on the International Space Station. New U.S. Timber Skyscraper Project Plans to Use 100K Cubic Feet of Lumber

North America's largest mass timber project will rise to 31 stories and be built much faster than originally planned after developers "found a more efficient parking layout" that kept the same number of spaces while reducing the height of the parking structure within the building.
